# **IMPROVING DATA ANALYTICS**

C4ADS Air Seizure Database contains data collected from customs press releases, local news reports, CITES annual reports, NGO reports, academic reports, and certain social media accounts.

#### Flying Under the Radar (2017):


- Included ivory, rhino horn, reptile, and bird seizure data from 2009 2016
- Identified trafficking hotspots, trends, and trafficking methods

#### In Plane Sight (2018):

- Expanded to include pangolin, marine product (e.g. seahorses), and mammal seizure data from 2009 2017
- Included analysis of seizure data from the WCO CEN (2015 2016) and FWS LEMIS databases (2009 – 2016)

#### Runway to Extinction (2020):

- Examines wildlife trafficking in six world regions: Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe, Middle East, and Oceania
- Focused on a three-year period (2016 2018) to highlight more recent trafficking trends


# **OVERALL**

We use the term "trafficking instance" to account for entire trafficking routes in our analysis, rather than just the point of seizure. For example, we would consider a shipment of turtles that originated in India, passed through Malaysia, and was seized in Thailand as a "seizure" for Thailand, and a "trafficking instance" for all three countries.


Flight Routes for All Wildlife Seizure in the C4ADS Air Seizure Database (2016 – 2018)



# OVERALL

#### **MAIN TAKEAWAYS:**

- Checked luggage is dominant by seizure count
- Mail seizures are likely undercounted, since they tend to be reported infrequently
- Traffickers of certain species and wildlife products tend to use the same transport methods (e.g. turtle traffickers rely on similar transport methods)



















#### Wildlife Product Processing

Seizure Date: Jan 4, 2018 Contraband: Rhino horn pieces Flights: Unknown Route: MPM – ADD – HKG Method: Passenger and Baggage

This seizure follows a pattern of increasing seizures of wildlife products as processing seems to shift to Africa. Seizures from passengers may increase as a result.



#### Rhino Horn on the Rise

Seizures of ivory have decreased, while seizures of rhino horn have increased. At the same time, ivory seizures have become increasingly small-scale.


Flights between Johannesburg and Hong Kong or Vietnam are particularly high-risk for rhino horn trafficking attempts.




#### Sniffer Dogs and Seizures in Transit

Kenya makes an unusually high number of seizures given its status as the most prominent transit country for wildlife trafficking in Africa. Many of these seizures are made by sniffer dogs, which are able to screen Kenya's many transiting passengers and their baggage quickly and efficiently. Recent declines in trafficking attempts passing through Kenya may suggest that effective enforcement is having a deterrent effect.



Domestic wildlife trafficking is prevalent in the Americas. Smuggled wildlife is often flown from remote regions to urban areas, either to be sold in wildlife markets or flown abroad.

#### **Big Cat Trafficking in Mexico**

Seizure Date: Feb 4, 2018 Contraband: Tiger cub Flights: Unknown Route: Jalisco – QRO Method: Mail




#### Aquarium Fish in Brazil

Seizure Date: Oct 2017 Contraband: 672 aquarium fish, including two species unknown to science Flights: Unknown Route: MAO – TBT Method: Baggage

Other similar seizures and comments from officials suggest that this seizure is not unique. Aquarium fish are reportedly trafficked in plastic bags filled with water in suitcases to Colombia through Tabatinga, Brazil.





#### **Bangkok to Japan**

Seizure Date: Oct 2017 Contraband: 10 otters Flights: Thai Air Asia X XJ600 Route: DMK - NRT Method: Baggage

One of a series of seizures involving live animals (otters, fennec foxes, jerboas, etc.) purchased in Bangkok's Chatuchak Weekend Market and destined for the pet trade in Japan.



#### Live Birds and Health Risks

Seizure Date: Dec 9, 2016 Contraband: 12 Chinese hwamei birds (CITES Appendix II) Flights: Unknown Route: SIN - Vietnam Method: Baggage

The birds were hidden in plastic containers without food or water for 12 hours. One tested positive for influenza A strain H3N8 (equine influenza, the apparent cause of the 1889 – 1890 flu pandemic.




#### Pig-Nosed Turtles and Insider Threat


Seizure Date: Feb 2016 Contraband: 3,230 pig-nosed turtles (CITES Appendix II) Flights: Sriwijaya Air Route: TIM – DJJ – CGK Method: Air Freight

Traffickers intentionally moved the turtles through the old airport, which had no x-ray machines. One of a series of seizures that ended after a ground handler for Sriwijaya Air was arrested.


















#### **Repeat Offender**

Seizure Date: June 26, 2018 Contraband: 19 eggs and 2 newlyhatched vultures Flights: Unknown Route: South Africa - LHR Method: Passenger

One of several seizures involving Jeffrey Lendrum, who tended to smuggle eggs wrapped in cloth around his abdomen.



#### **European Eel Trafficking**

Seizure Date: Feb 6, 2019 Contraband: 252,000 European eels Flights: Unknown Route: ZAG - SVO Method: Baggage

Many European eel trafficking instances show signs of organized activity. In this case, two suitcases were filled with bags of European eels, accompanied by ice and surrounded by thermal padding to maintain a steady temperature.



#### Bushmeat in Europe

Seizure Date: April 2017 Contraband: Dead monkey and two skinned pangolins Flights: Unknown Route: Eq. Guinea – MAD – BIO Method: Baggage

Passenger left his suitcase at Madrid Airport during a stop-over. Bushmeat is in demand at many African diaspora markets in European cities. Much of the bushmeat originates in West Africa.





#### **Repeat Offender**

Seizure Date: June 26, 2018 Contraband: 19 eggs and 2 newlyhatched vultures Flights: Unknown Route: South Africa - LHR Method: Passenger

One of several seizures involving Jeffrey Lendrum, who tended to smuggle eggs wrapped in cloth around his abdomen.



#### **European Eel Trafficking**

Seizure Date: Feb 6, 2019 Contraband: 252,000 European eels Flights: Unknown Route: ZAG - SVO Method: Baggage

Many European eel trafficking instances show signs of organized activity. In this case, two suitcases were filled with bags of European eels, accompanied by ice and surrounded by thermal padding to maintain a steady temperature.




#### **Bushmeat in Europe**


Seizure Date: April 2019 Contraband: White-bellied pangolin and Gabonese viper bushmeat Flights: Unknown Route: Cameroon - ZRH Method: Baggage

Officials found the bushmeat in the possession of a Cameroonian woman residing in Switzerland. The meat violated both epidemic and species protection regulations.


















**Falcon Trafficking** 

Seizure Date: Oct 2016 Contraband: 41 peregrine falcons Flights: Unknown Route: CAI - Bahrain Method: Baggage


Trafficker bribed four police officers to smuggle drugged falcons with their eyelids sewn shut. The birds were supposed to be sold to "princes in the Gulf."

#### Tiger Cubs Abandoned in Lebanon

Seizure Date: March 2017 Contraband: 3 tiger cubs Flights: Shamwings Route: Ukraine – BEY – Syria Method: Air Freight

Three tiger cubs were stuck in Beirut Airport for seven days in a small crate without adequate bedding, food, or water. The cubs' transport conditions were in violation of IATA's Live Animals Regulations (LAR), which invalidated their CITES permit.







#### Transit Hub for Smuggled Wildlife

Wildlife trafficking instances passing through Middle Eastern airports numbered at least five times more than seizures in Middle Eastern airports between 2016 and 2018.








#### **Mail Seizures**

Unlike every other world region, Oceanian countries discovered and seized trafficked wildlife in mail shipments more than in any other transport method. Many of these seizures occurred in Australia, where officials seem to be particularly adept at identifying contraband in mail shipments and reporting them publicly on the Australia Border Force (ABF) website.



#### **Reptiles in Perth Airport**

Seizure Date: Dec 13, 2016 Contraband: 10 bobtail lizards and one blue-tongued lizard Flights: Unknown Route: PER – HKG Method: Mail

Seizure led officials to a Chinese passenger boarding a flight for Hong Kong wearing the same type of socks used to wrap the lizards. A second mail shipment was found on Dec 14<sup>th</sup>.




#### **Biothreats in Island Nations**

Seizure Date: June 2017 Contraband: 50 turtles and lizards Flights: Unknown Route: Indonesia – SYD Method: Mail

This shipment was declared and packaged as toys. All 50 animals were euthanized to prevent the potential spread of disease to Australian species, which are ill-equipped to handle diseases originating elsewhere.





#### **Mail Seizures**

Unlike every other world region, Oceanian countries discovered and seized trafficked wildlife in mail shipments more than in any other transport method. Many of these seizures occurred in Australia, where officials seem to be particularly adept at identifying contraband in mail shipments and reporting them publicly on the Australia Border Force (ABF) website.



#### **Reptiles in Perth Airport**

Seizure Date: June 5, 2019 Contraband: 13 bobtail lizards Flights: Unknown Route: PER – Singapore ; PER – Malaysia Method: Baggage

Officials discovered bobtail lizards hidden in laundry bags inside plastic containers wrapped in plastic. Some lizards were in poor health. Both suspects were part of an international syndicate linked to similar offenses in Sydney, Melbourne, and Perth in 2019.



#### **Biothreats in Island Nations**

Seizure Date: June 2017 Contraband: 50 turtles and lizards Flights: Unknown Route: Indonesia – SYD Method: Mail

This shipment was declared and packaged as toys. All 50 animals were euthanized to prevent the potential spread of disease to Australian species, which are ill-equipped to handle diseases originating elsewhere.



# RECOMMENDATIONS

#### AWARENESS

- Increase awareness among air passengers, aviation staff, freight forwarders, shippers, and enforcement officials.
- Adopt or create a pamphlet or tool tailored to each country to help customs and enforcement officials, as well as relevant industry personnel, identify restricted species and wildlife products commonly trafficked through their territory.
- Ensure public reporting mechanisms are in place and well-known so passengers can report suspected wildlife trafficking instances.

#### TRAINING

- Provide training on red flag indicators associated with wildlife traffickers and shipments. Ensure that follow-up trainings are provided as necessary to support uptake.
- Incorporate training for airline staff on how to safely handle trafficked live or dead animals after discovery into existing training programs. Create and provide "forensic protection protocols" training to preserve evidence for trial.

#### **ENFORCEMENT**

innovation for peace

- Develop clear escalation procedures upon discovery of potential illegal activity.
- Engage with the private sector to ensure that aviation personnel are aware of the types of information needed to follow up on reports of wildlife trafficking.
   Provide feedback to industry and the public on the outcomes of submitted tips.
- Develop post-seizure procedures to safely and securely store wildlife products or ensure the proper care of trafficked live animals. Develop procedures to monitor seized live animals and wildlife products.

- Dedicate additional resources to combatting the illegal wildlife trade in common hub airports exploited by wildlife traffickers.
- Develop or enhance customs screening procedures for transit flights.
- Customs and enforcement should be aware of flight routes opening through high-risk areas.
- Develop and maintain a comprehensive internal database of entities previously involved in wildlife seizures.
- Develop a system to test counter-wildlife trafficking protocols.
- Improve wildlife customs screening requirements for postal mail shipments. Ensure mail seizures are reported to the same degree as passenger, checked luggage, or air freight seizures.
- Increase cooperation with other agencies along high-risk supply chains. Inform foreign agencies of seizures on flights that have left or are destined for their countries.

#### SEIZURE REPORTING

- Store collected seizure information in one centralized database.
- Develop a procedure to publicly report seizure information. Update seizure press releases with prosecution results.

#### POLICY

• National laws should, at a minimum, enforce CITES regulations and regulate the domestic trade in non-native species. Penalties for wildlife trafficking should be raised until they are sufficiently deterrent.

#### DETECTION

• Pursue shift towards electronic paperwork for air freight and updated technology for customs screening. Expand cargo and passenger information systems to include red flags for IWT. Incorporate CITES e-permits in e-documentation systems.






